## **Lurana Women's Shelter:**ONE YEAR UPDATE

A woman entering Lurana is in a moment of crisis. Around 60% of those who seek refuge at Lurana face a high risk of being murdered by their intimate partner.

CSS provides a full range of care to women and children facing abuse from the 21-day emergency supports of Lurana, through the second stage supports of La Salle Shelter, and into the transitional housing supports of St. Katherine Drexal Place. In Red Deer CSS also operates the Morning Star drop in-centre for women in crisis.

Last year, 145 women and 144 children received care at Lurana Shelter. Thanks to donor support CSS has renovated the second-floor units and basement, to create an even more welcoming environment.





Zara arrived at her sister's home in Edmonton with her two young children, after spending 15 years in a refugee camp.

She was hoping to find peace and comfort at her sister's home, however this was not the case at all. Zara's sister was often angry, and the situation soon became abusive. Her sister would yell, fight, and withhold the finances Zara needed.

With no other support or income, Zara knew she needed to leave so she and her children could start over. She arrived at Lurana Shelter desperate, alone, and afraid.

The situation was even more dire as her youngest son had a rare autoimmune disease. CSS staff worked with Zara to create a healthy routine for her children, including registering them

for school. The staff provided free childcare so Zara could take her son to medical appointments. They also helped her secure subsidized housing, where she moved into her first real home in years. Zara's confidence in herself and her abilities grew so much as a result of the support she received that she registered herself for school and has begun dreaming of a career of her own.

Zara and her children still receive regular visits from their CSS' Outreach Worker and today they are thriving. Zara has found the safety she dreamed of when coming to Canada, and has created a happy home for her children to grow up in.

### \$50,000 raised for the 'Market at Gianna'

#### NEW SOCIAL ENTERPRISE PROVIDES JOBS FOR MOTHERS IN NEED

Farrah was pregnant when her mom died. She didn't have any other supports in her life. This, her lowest point, is when she found CSS' Gianna Centre.

In the Gianna Centre, Farrah found kindness, friendship, and even a new career, as she raised a newborn.

"I received support while grieving," says Farrah. "But the Market opportunity also came along, and I learned how to run my own business."

Last summer a group of Gianna's moms formed a new Catholic Social Services' (CSS) social enterprise, selling crafts and food to the passing public. And in doing so, the *Market at Gianna* was born.

The Market allows women to earn an income from what they create and what they sell.

In December 2021, the Grey Nuns of Montreal pledged a matching gift of \$25,000 to Gianna Centre, to be unlocked when an additional \$25,000 was raised.

For Mother's Day in 2022, CSS invited donors to raise the matching funds. In just three weeks the goal was reached!
